We are happy to announce that <u>SHIROKURO</u> has won the <u>Dioraphte Dance Prize 2014</u> on Sunday 5 October. <u>SHIROKURO</u> (2012) is a dance-concert, a rich harvest of collaboration between Nicole Beutler, dancer Mitchell-Lee van Rooij and lighting designer Jean Kalman.

The production most suitable for an international tour is a multidisciplinary performance, that in a ingenious way brings together music, dance and visual arts. The hallucinating and raw music, the strength of the dancer, set and lighting design, come together in an overwhelming experience.
