Culture All Nippon - CAN

Since I have learned about the Dutch culture policy through my work in the past years, I always wanted to share the idea and philosophy of it with my home country. I introduced it occasionally at workshops and lectures; however, the COVID period provided a more significant opportunity.

After participating in the <u>Resiliart</u> panel discussion organized by UNESCO last May, celebrating filmmaker Naomi Kawase and Hiroko Tsuboi-Friedman, expert facilitator of the *UNESCO 2005 Convention on Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions*, and I myself, decided to take action. We have founded a new organization called 'Culture All Nippon (CAN)'.

CAN aims to gently link and unite cultural organizations, individuals working in culture, and individuals and organizations supporting culture in Japan. In order to create dialogue, CAN acts as a platform for networking and discussion. CAN creates a mechanism in which those collective voices are heard and reflected in the process of policymaking.

On May 11th, CAN presented the first kickoff event, a symposium supported by the Embassy of the Netherlands in Tokyo. We invited Jan Zoet, chairman of the Dutch organization <u>Kunsten'92</u>, and Seiichi Kondo, former commissioner, Agency of Cultural Affairs, as lecturers. The formula of CAN was based on the model of Kunsten'92, linking both large and small organizations, and individuals from all art disciplines.
